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## Upper Deerfield Township Committee Reorganizes Jan 2, 2014

James P. Crilley was selected to serve as Mayor and John T. O'Neill, Sr. was selected to serve as Deputy Mayor for 2014, at the Reorganization Meeting of the Township Committee on January 2nd in the Municipal Building.

John Daddario and Bruce Peterson who were re-elected to the Township Committee at the November election were sworn-in to serve another three year term at the reorganization meeting. Scott Smith is the fifth member of the Township Committee in 2014.

## **\$399,640 Small Cities Facilities Grant Announced**

Upper Deerfield Township received a \$399,640 Small Cities Facilities Grant from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs to begin ADA complaint upgrades to the recreational facilities. ADA compliant bathrooms at North Cumberland Little League, Cohansey Soccer and Cumberland Midget Football will be installed as well as providing some ADA compliant pathways and parking at the recreational facilities. Upgrades from the grant funds should be completed by this June.

## Single Stream Recycling begins Feb 14th

The Cumberland County Improvement Authority is changing to single stream recycling. This means that household metal and aluminum cans, glass and plastic containers, newsprint, magazines and cardboard will all be disposed in the same recycling container at the Convenience Center. **Please review pages 7, 8, 9 and 10 to see the recycling changes that will take place beginning on Friday, February 14th at the Convenience Center.**



## Seabrook School Kindergarten And Preschool Registration

Seabrook School will hold Preschool and Kindergarten registration by appointment only on Wednesday, May 21st and Wednesday, May 28th. Children who will enter Preschool for the 2014-15 school year must be 4 years of age on or before October 1, 2014. Children who will enter Kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before October 1, 2014.

All students entering school for the first time will be required to have a physical examination by his/her family doctor, original birth certificate, immunization information and proof of residency. A physical form will be provided for your doctor to complete.

You may contact the Seabrook School to request or pick up an enrollment packet and schedule your appointment. Contact the school nurse, Ilda Tretheway, at 455-2267 ext. 4203 for more information. **Appointments must be made for each child to be registered.**

## A Message From Your Dog Registrar

A State mandated Dog Census is currently underway in the Township which should be completed by the end of April.

### REGISTER YOUR DOG FOR 2014

All dogs 7 months or older, or having a permanent set of teeth must be licensed. The state requires that a rabies shot be valid for 10 months out of the current year.

If you own 6 dogs or more you must obtain a kennel license from the Township and receive County Health Department approval for your kennel.

If your dog has passed away, please notify the Registrar so we can update our records.

**If your dog's renewal rabies shot occurs after April 30th, please bring a note from the Veterinarian stating that the pet's shot was not due until this date and the late fee will be waived for medical reasons.**

### REMINDERS

#### SMOKE DETECTORS

Install on every level of your house. Test them regularly and install new batteries as needed.



#### CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS

Install a carbon monoxide detector in the hallway outside your bedroom areas. Test them regularly and install new batteries as needed.



#### FIRE EXTINGUISHER

Install a fire extinguisher in or near your kitchen and know how to use it.

#### HOUSE NUMBERS

For 911 Emergency purposes, those who do not have your house number on a 4" x 4" post at the end of your driveway, please do so. This is very important should Emergency Services need to find your residence.



#### AUXILIARY HOME HEATING DEVICES

Auxiliary heating devices for your home such as a fireplace, wood or coal stove, gas heater, etc. should be used with care. Have these devices installed and checked professionally and don't forget to have your primary heater and chimney cleaned and checked each season.

#### ELECTRICAL

Replace damaged extension cords. Do not run them under rugs. Do not overload electrical circuits during the Winter Season.

## CONSTRUCTION CODE CORNER

**Burrrr . . .** it is getting cold outside. Maybe you are thinking about installing a fireplace insert or wood stove to chase the chill away. You are only four easy steps away from enjoying the warmth of a wood stove.

1. Select a good location in your home for your wood stove.
  2. Purchase a wood stove or fireplace insert that will suit your needs.
  3. Supply the Construction Office with your completed permit application.
- Application packet should include the following; a) manufactures installation instructions, b) completed Building and Fire Technical sections, c) completed and signed permit "jacket".
4. Call for the required inspections.
  5. Enjoy your new wood stove!

## Getting Married? Congratulations!!

In order to get married in New Jersey, the couple has to go to the municipality in which either party reside in.



You must bring in a copy of your birth certificate, driver's license, passport or state I.D, social security card or social security number for identification purposes. If you are divorced or have had a marriage annulled, please bring the divorce decree or civil annulment documents. If your former spouse is deceased, please bring the death certificate.

There is a \$28.00 application fee and a seventy-two hour waiting period.

Your marriage license will be retained at the township in which you get married.

### Township Offers Online Tax and Utility Payments

The Township of Upper Deerfield offers the convenience of making Tax and Utility payments online by going to [www.upperdeerfield.com](http://www.upperdeerfield.com). Click on the "Pay Taxes & Utility Bills" link on the home page of the Township's website that will allow payments to be processed.

There is a user fee of \$1.05 for each electronic check and a fee of \$3.95 for each Visa Debit Transaction with this service. All other Debit/Credit Card transactions have a user fee of 2.95% (percent) of the transaction.

**THE CLINIC IS FREE!** Residents may go to any clinic on the list. You do not have to live in the township in which the clinic is held. If animals have been vaccinated for rabies any time in the past, pet owners should bring proof of prior rabies vaccine to receive a 3 year certificate. Dogs must be on a leash or in a carrier. Cats must be in a carrier or closed container with ventilation. ## Beverage Cartons are now recyclable

Cartons can now be mixed with bottles and cans for recycling. The material will be sorted at the recycling facility and sent to a mill to be made into recycled paper products and even building materials.

Examples of these containers include shelf stable cartons for juice, milk, soy milk, soup, broth, and wine. In the refrigerated section you can also recycle milk, juice, egg substitute containers. Make sure they are empty, remove any straws, and give them a quick rinse before placing them in your recycling bucket and dispose of all lids.



## Convenience Center Changes Begin Feb. 14th

Since the Cumberland County Improvement Authority is changing to single stream recycling, **all household metal, aluminum, glass and plastic containers, newsprint, magazines and cardboard will be disposed of into the red recycling containers located on the ramp.** There will no longer be a separate container for newspapers and magazines or any small red containers for cardboard. These items will now be disposed of in the **red co-mingled container** on the ramp. There will be a large open top container by the old ramp for disposal of large cardboard appliance, furniture and TV boxes.

Major changes will continue to take place throughout the year at the Convenience Center. The old metal building will be torn down and a new pole building will take its place this spring. Recycling of white goods (appliances) and electronic goods will be moved inside the new building. A separate exit road will be created, the bulky waste containers and brush disposal area will be relocated and a parallel duplicate ramp for household waste and single stream recycling will be constructed. All of these improvements at the Convenience Center will be paid for through use of grant funds awarded from previous recycling tonnage grants.

### Cardboard Disposal

Single Stream Recycling requires cardboard to be disposed of in the **red co-mingled recyclable container** on the ramp. Please flatten all cardboard boxes before you get to the Convenience Center, since the cardboard will have to be disposed of in the square openings in the **red co-mingled recyclable container**. If you have large cardboard appliance, furniture or TV boxes, there will be a large open top container by the old ramp to dispose of these large boxes. **Once again please flatten the large cardboard boxes before you get to the Convenience Center.**

### Shredded Paper Disposal



Shredded Paper will have its own separate recycling container that will be located by the building at the Convenience Center. **Shredded paper must be disposed of in clear plastic bags.**

## Carton Boxes are now recyclable

A carton box is usually made of paperboard and is a type of packaging suitable for food, pharmaceuticals, hardware, and many other types of products. These carton boxes are part of the single stream recycling effort and are readily found in the kitchen. Sometimes they may be referred to as kitchen cardboard or grey cardboard. Boxes that contain cereal, crackers, pasta, rice and the 12, 24 or 30 pack paperboard beverage container packing are all examples of carton boxes that should be included in your single stream recycling.





## Township Receives \$36,574.04 Recycling Grant

## Tarps Required for Pick Ups and Utility Vehicles When Transporting Trash, Brush or Garbage

State Law and Township Ordinance requires that if trash, brush or garbage is to be transported by a pick-up or utility trailer on any public street in the Township, the trash or brush must be contained in covered containers. If the containers are not covered or if the trash, brush or garbage exceeds the height of the pick-up bed, it must be covered or tarped. The purpose of the ordinance is to prevent trash from being windblown and littering Township roadways and private properties. Help Prevent Littering from occurring in the Township.

**Vehicles will be turned away from the Convenience Center beginning in April 2014, if they do not have a tarp covering the trash or brush.**



# HOW "THE RECYCLING LOOP" WORKS

The recycling process begins when individuals place recyclable products and packages in a recycling bin. The second step is when a company processes those recycled materials and creates new products. Finally, consumers close the loop by buying recycled material. This final step restarts the cycle and ensures the success and value of recycling.

## • Collection and Processing

– Recycling collection occurs nationwide and depends on community participation. Recycling varies by community, but most recyclables are collected curbside or through drop-off centers, buy-back centers, or deposit/refund programs. After collection, recyclables go to a materials recovery facility to be sorted and prepared for market. Recycled materials are like any commodity, so prices for the materials change and fluctuate with global market demand and quality of the raw materials.

• **Manufacturing** – Raw materials, such as fiber, metals, plastics, and glass are then used to make new products. Many of these will become the same product in what is known as closed-loop recycling. For example, glass, aluminum, and steel can be used to make new bottles or cans. Many fibers, such as those from cardboard, are used to make new boxes. And most common household items contain some recycled materials. For example, recycled plastics are turned into new bottles, but they can also be made into carpeting, park benches, and fibers for clothing.

## • Buying Recycled Products

– The recycling loop depends upon governments, businesses, and consumers choosing to purchase products and packaging with recycled content.

The decision to "buy recycled" closes the recycling loop. Some products, like aluminum and steel cans, can be recycled again and again, while others, like paper, may be recycled

once into bathroom tissue and then reach the end of its life. However, it is always important to buy recycled products to keep them "in demand" and support the recycling cycle.

## Display Your Assigned 911 Number for Emergency Vehicles

In order to allow state police, fire and ambulance personnel to locate your residence in the case of an emergency, the Township has required all buildings in the Township to post the 911 number assigned to them. The owner of the property should put the numbers on a six foot, four by four inch post that extends at least forty inches above the ground on the house side edge of the driveway. The numbers are to be placed two inches from the top of the post and on two sides of the post so that emergency vehicles can see the numbers traveling in either direction along the roadway. Reflective numbers are available free of charge at the municipal building in the construction office. If a resident needs help installing the post, please contact one of the local fire companies and they will assist you. Before you dig, call 1-800-272-1000 to locate any potential underground utilities. Please allow three working days for the company to mark out the locations of any utilities.

# An Important Message From The Fire Safety Official About Staying Safe This Winter

A friendly public safety reminder from the Upper Deerfield Fire Prevention Office. As life is busy for everyone, there are a few things that we can do to keep our families safe year round. First, if you haven't already, please take the time to change the batteries in your Smoke / Carbon Monoxide detectors. Lives are saved by properly operating smoke detectors that function correctly and notify us of a fire. Most people change the batteries in these devices when they change the clocks; however studies have shown that changing your batteries at the beginning of the New Year also helps us remember to do this as well. Whichever time you chose to change them is ok as long as we remember to do so. It is recommended that you replace these devices around the 10-year mark. The date of manufacturing is stamped on the back of these devices and can be viewed clearly.

Also a recent video has become popular on social media and is worth the 5 minutes to view. This video depicts the dangers that can result from improperly discarded 9 volt batteries. ## PROPER USE OF WOODSTOVES AND FIREPLACES IN COLD WEATHER MONTHS WILL HELP KEEP YOU SAFE

**The Department of Environmental Protection recommends the following guidelines:**

- Allow wood to season for at least six months before burning it, meaning the wood should sit outdoors for at least this period of time. Seasoned wood is darker, has cracks in the end grain and sounds hollow when smacked against another piece of wood. Wood gathered after Super-storm Sandy is most likely dry enough now for proper burning but the longer the wood sits before burning, the better that the wood will burn, provided it is stored in a dry place.
- Use a wood moisture meter to test the moisture content of wood. Wood burns most efficiently when its moisture content is below 20 percent.
- Store wood, stacked neatly off the ground with the top covered to avoid rainwater.

- Start fires with newspaper and dry kindling and keep them burning hot.
- Regularly remove ashes to ensure proper airflow.
- Never burn garbage, cardboard, plastics, wrapping materials, painted materials or other materials in your stove or fireplace.
- Remember to keep anything flammable - including drapes, furniture, newspapers and books - far away from any wood-burning appliance.
- Keep an accessible and recently inspected fire extinguisher nearby.
