Home Rehabilitation Grant Applications Accepted

Upper Deerfield Township will apply this September for a \$200,000 grant to help income-qualified homeowners repair their homes. The Township is accepting new applications from homeowners who would like to take advantage of the rehabilitation program.

The home rehabilitation program will provide assistance up to \$25,000 to help with home repairs including windows, roofs, floors, heating systems, insulation, woodwork, plumbing and similar work to remedy serious home deficiencies. Half of the assistance provided converts to a grant in six years. The other half is only paid back (without interest) when the homeowner sells the home. Assistance is limited to homeowners who had 2006 household incomes below the following ceilings.

Applicants will be qualified on a "first come, first serve" basis. Applications received after that date will continue to be placed on our waiting list in the order they are received.

NPP Community Group Needs Your Participation

This year the Neighborhood Preservation Program (NPP) partnered with the local school system and sponsored 19 children to attend the summer CER Program. This program ran for 5 weeks and consisted of classes and field trips taught by

teachers and aimed at the various age groups within the program. Next year the program hopes to sponsor even more children from the neighborhood.

In addition to the various projects, a Community Group has been

established which meets once a month-usually the third Monday of each month. The group not only discusses various areas of interest such as Preventing Identity Theft and Neighborhood Crime Prevention, but they also have sponsored yoga classes to benefit the mind and the body, sponsored craft classes where decorative holiday wreaths were made for our doors as well as spring centerpieces for our tables at Easter. Classes have been sponsored for the Rutgers Extension Services to instruct how to care for our gardens. In the fall, a class on spring gardens showed how to grow different plants and bulbs. Daffodil bulbs were given to the participants to plant for spring time blooms. In the spring, Rutgers conducted a class on vegetable gardens and herb gardens. Tomato plants, pepper plants and herbs were distributed to all who participated that evening.

The June meeting had the Executive Director of Alliance for Substance Abuse Prevention, Andrea Bianco-Rieti, present a Powerpoint presentation on substance abuse specifically drug and alcohol abuse.

She also spoke about the growing problem that our area is having with gang activity, how to recognize where gang activity is going on and how to combat it in the neighborhood to protect our children.

An objective of the Community Group was to form a Neighborhood

Pre-School 4 Year Old Registration – To be eligible for the Pre-School 4 Year Old Program children must be 4 years old by October 1, 2007.

SHADE TREE COMMITTEE UPDATE...

With the passage of the township tree ordinance, 13 especially large, old, or unusual trees in the township were designated as "heritage trees". The committee is currently looking for another half dozen specimens to add to the list this year. If you have noticed the lack of foliage on the old white oak on Old Burlington Road, it suffered a lightning strike about a year ago. Recovery from that will be a slow process.

Redevelopment Areas North and South of Carlls Corner



In 2001, the Township of Upper Deerfield created the boundaries for a Redevelopment Zone north of Cornwell Drive, south of Parsonage Road along the Highway 77 corridor. The Redevelopment Plan and Design Guidelines for the area were approved in December of 2005, after consider-

able review and discussion by the Planning Board, Economic Development Committee and the Township Committee.

The northern redevelopment plan allows Upper Deerfield officials to better control growth along the gateway into the Township. The plan provides for a smooth

transition from retail to professional office, to light industrial, to other industrial applications. The plan does not allow retail growth all along Highway 77, but rather focuses the growth to one area where transportation issues may be addressed and resolved. Throughout the entire redevelopment area, developers will be required to conform to design guidelines, including site development, building design and signage that have been established to create an attractive aesthetic gateway along the Township's primary corridor.

The Township Planning Board has recently recommended, and the Township Committee adopted, the southern redevelopment boundaries. This area is located primarily south of Cornwell Drive and Landis Avenue along Highway 77 and Burlington Road until the Bridgeton border. Township officials are now studying the allowable zoning uses for this area in order to determine appropriate development uses that may occur in the future. The Planning Board will be discussing the plan for the southern redevelopment area at

their September 17 and October 15 meetings. If you have questions, or want to provide input, please come to the meetings.

Master Plan and Residential Growth Outlined

The Township prepared a Master Plan in 1988, which outlined areas that should be designated as agricultural, residential and commercial. Within each of the zones, suitable uses have been designated, areas have been identified where potential growth should occur and guidelines were established for how the growth may happen. As part of the Master Plan review process, the Plan has been revisited and revised at least every six years since its inception. The last reexamination of the Master Plan took place in 2003.

The Township Planning Board and Township Committee have been reviewing aspects of the Township Master Plan and making modi-

fications since 2003. In 2004, minimum lot sizes were increased in all residential zones, and clustering of large tracts of land was allowed, which keeps the total unit density the same but requires large portions of the land to be left for open space. Township officials also reduced the number of apartment units or townhouse units that could be placed per acre in residential areas zoned for high density.

The Township, like all municipalities in New Jersey, may not restrict or prevent growth from occurring because of State statutes and State court decisions. However, a municipality may regulate or direct its growth. Through the Master Plan, the Township has provided for growth

in the southern portion of the Township, where sewer and water are available. Approximately 60 to 65 per cent of the Township has been zoned for agricultural uses. The northern portion of the Township is zoned agricultural and a majority of the 3,000 plus acres that have been preserved in the Township through the State Agricultural Program are in this region.

Township officials, who all live in the community, continue to try to preserve the rural character of the Township, maintain the quality of life that most people expect and preserve the environment, while providing growth in areas with adequate infrastructure to maintain a strong economic base in order to relieve future property tax burdens. The Public and their comments are always welcome at Township Committee and Planning Board Meetings.

Environmental Commission News

The Upper Deerfield Township Environmental Commission has had a busy year. Building on the research included in the Environmental Resource Inventory, completed last year, we are working to finalize two important plans:

1. Open Space & Recreation
2. Farmland Preservation

Two committees of Upper Deerfield residents have been working on these plans for over six months. Drawing on the survey completed by more than 400 residents last summer, these committees have pulled together a wealth of information—including text and maps—that is now available for review. Residents may borrow copies from the Environmental Commission

Secretary, Teresa Warburton (856-455-9591), at the municipal building. The plans have been presented to residents at several public meetings.

The final versions are expected to be reviewed by the Planning Board in September. Recommendations in these plans will form the basis for revisions to the township's master plan and ordinances.

Residents serving on the committee that prepared the Open Space & Recreation Plan are Blake Maloney, Chair, Bruno Basile, Jodi Hirata, George E. Joyce, Jr., Joseph LaCotte, Kenneth Lavine, Christine Nolan, Douglas Rainear, and Secretary Teresa Warburton.

The Farmland Preservation Plan Agricultural Advisory Committee includes Blake Maloney, Chair, Edward Overdeest, Donald Johnson, Jr., David Ackley, James Crilley and Steve Smith. Critical information was supplied by Township Administrator Roy Spoltore and former Tax Assessor Marge Nuzzo.

Both committees are being guided by consultant Suzanne McCarthy from the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission. Also contributing are Robert Brewer and Matthew Pisarski of the Cumberland County Planning Department, Timothy Brill of the NJ Agricultural Farmland Preservation Program, Laura Swerzak of the NJ Conservation Foundation and Beth Ciuzio of NJ Audubon Society. Funding for the preparation of these plans is provided

Attention: First through Fourth Avenues

In December of 2004, the Township of Upper Deerfield was awarded a Neighborhood Preservation Program Grant for \$100,000 a year for five years from the Department of Community Affairs in Trenton, New Jersey. This grant is to be used in the Seabrook Village area of First Avenue through Fourth Avenue to rehabilitate homes. Qualified home owners who need assistance to correct serious code problems should apply to replace faulty roofs, windows, floors, insulation, plumbing, electrical, heating and hot water heaters.

Those who qualify will have a mortgage and six year lien placed on their home in the amount of one half the assistance amounts. The mortgage will be released at the rate of one-sixth of the original grant per year for six years, which means one-half of the total amount is forgiven after 6 years. The remaining amount continues to exist as a lien against the property until the property is sold, at which time the remaining amount, (1/2) of the grant is paid back to the Township, free of any interest and penalties. This is a **TOTALLY INTEREST FREE LOAN.**

To qualify for the grants, a resident must provide (1) a copy of the deed to their home, (2) proof that the home is insured and (3) a copy of their 2006 IRS 1040 Tax Return. Also, all property taxes and water/sewer bills must be paid current.

If you are a homeowner whose income is too high to qualify for the Home Rehabilitation Grant or a Landlord whose rental property is located on First through Fourth Avenues, you are eligible to apply for a Paint/Material Grant. This

grant covers improvements to the outside of the home **only**, (i.e. doors, windows, siding, roof, and guttering) and the maximum reimbursement is \$1,000.00.

Home Rehabilitation applications may be obtained in the Neighborhood Preservation Office on the upper level of the Municipal Building located on Route 77. More than Rehabilitating Homes . . . The Five Year Plan

The Neighborhood Preservation Program Grant in the Seabrook Area is responsible for more than just providing funding for home rehabilitation projects. The program will allow projects that will include the beautification of the neighborhood by removing the buttonwood trees that damaged the sidewalks on Third and Fourth Avenues, replacing the sidewalks damaged by these trees, providing a replacement tree for any homeowner who would like a shade tree for their yard and in year 5, there are plans to purchase flower bedding plants as well as flowering bushes for residents in the neighborhood. As the Seabrook Water District plans are finalized, the NPP program intends to supplement the cost of installing water meters for each home on First through Fourth Avenues.

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
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Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund Celebrates 20 years Model for Success for Inter-Local Shared Services



In 1986, a group of municipalities conducted a feasibility study to determine if they could create a regional pool to more cost effectively provide fire, liability, auto and workers' compensation coverage. After weighing both the short term benefit of immediate savings with the long term objectives of cost stabilization, 7 municipalities chartered the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund (ACMJIF) in January 1987, to avoid the high costs and limited coverages that were associated with municipal insurance packages at a time of unfavorable uncertainty within the national insurance market.

In June of 1988, Upper Deerfield Township became the 11th municipality to join the ACMJIF. Currently, the Atlantic County Municipal Joint Insurance Fund consists of 43 municipalities in Atlantic, Cape May and Cumberland counties. Besides saving local taxpayers millions of dollars in the form of lower premiums in the past 20 years, the ACMJIF has returned 17 million dollars to member municipalities in surplus distributions as every dollar not spent by the JIF is returned to the members. An example of the savings is the insurance policies Upper Deerfield Township now carries contain broader and increased levels of coverage for virtually the same premium the Township paid in the late 1980s. Today, the ACMJIF stands as one of the greatest success stories of inter-local

cooperation and an example of what local government can do to provide solutions to complex problems.

Currently more than half of New Jersey Municipalities have elected to join forces with

each other to secure insurance protection through one of 14 regional municipal Joint Insurance Funds (JIF) in the State. These inter-local agreements continue to enable member municipalities to lower the ultimate cost of

their fire, liability, automobile, and workers' compensation insurance by pooling resources and achieving economies of scale and other advantages previously available only to large corporations or very large cities.

Upper Deerfield Shares Services ~ Reduces Costs

Upper Deerfield Township has recently entered into shared service agreements with Deerfield Township and Elk Township and cooperative purchase agreements with the County of Cumberland in an effort to provide effective and efficient services while reducing and sharing costs for these services provided.

Governor Corzine has identified the consolidation of government services as an integral component to help reduce the cost of property taxes.

In 2006, Rosenhayn Fire and Rescue and the Upper Deerfield Emergency Medical Service

entered into a mutual aid agreement. Effective March of 2007, Upper Deerfield and Deerfield entered into an inter-local agreement to share the services of a construction code official, building sub code official, fire sub code official and a construction office administrative assistant.

Upper Deerfield and Elk Township entered into an inter-local agreement to share the services for the position of Tax Assessor in May of 2007. The Township of Upper Deerfield has entered into many joint cooperative price agreements with the County of Cumberland to purchase salt for snow removal, gasoline and natural gas in order to reduce the costs of goods due to the economies of scale.

Governor Corzine has identified the consolidation of government services as an integral component to help reduce the cost of property taxes. Upper Deerfield officials continue to review all department expenditures to determine if there are any ways to reduce costs for services provided.

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
SECC PROMOTES A NEW BOOK SIGNING

Outside Water Usage Restrictions For Township & Seabrook Water Customers

Effective June 7, 2007: All Township Water and Seabrook Water District customers will only be allowed to use water outside their residence for nonessential purposes every other day. Homes designated by even-numbered addresses will be allowed to water lawns or gardens on even days for three hours on such days - either between 6 am and 9 am or between 4 pm and 7 pm. Homes designated by odd-numbered addresses will be allowed to water lawns or gardens on odd days for three hours on such days - either between 6 am and 9 am or between 4 pm and 7 pm. On the 31st day of any month there will be no outside water

use allowed.

This restriction applies only to those who are connected to the municipal water supply system and not to residents or business owners having private wells.

Currently the Township water treatment facility is exceeding the State permitted water allocation per month and the system is running at or near capacity 24 hours per day. These restrictions are needed to enable the water system to return to normal operations and to allow time to provide proper maintenance on all equipment.

Orillia Drive, Weymouth Place and Birdsall Drive to be Overlaid in August

The Township has received approval for a grant request from the New Jersey Department of Transportation to repave Orillia Drive, Weymouth Place and Birdsall Drive. The \$145,000 grant to overlay the three Township Streets from the State of New Jersey Transportation Trust Grant was announced by Senator Sweeney and Assemblymen Fisher and Burzichelli.

The contract to pave the roadways was approved at the June 21st meeting of the Township Committee. Work is to be completed in the month of August, before the start of school.

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





Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.




