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Upper Deerfield Township Committee Reorganizes for 2012

James P. Crilley was selected as Mayor and John T. O'Neill, Sr. was selected to serve as Deputy Mayor for 2012, at the Reorganization Meeting of the Township Committee in January.

James Crilley who was re-elected to the Township Committee at the November elec-

tion was sworn-in at the reorganization meeting in January to serve another three-year term on the Committee. John Daddario, Bruce Peterson and Scott Smith complete the Township Committee for 2012.

\$400,000 Small Cities Facilities Grant Announced

Upper Deerfield Township received a \$400,000 Small Cities Facilities Grant from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs to upgrade the infrastructure in the School Village section of Seabrook. Improvements include replacing sewer lines, installation of new storm water drainage, sidewalks on School Lane and the repaving of School Lane, East Parsonage Road and Olde Road. The Small Cities grant is the fifth Small Cities grant received by the Township since 2006 to upgrade the infrastructure in the Village of Seabrook.

Home Rehabilitation Grants Announced Small Cities \$180,000

Upper Deerfield Township received a \$180,000 Small Cities Home Rehabilitation Grant from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs to help income-qualified Upper Deerfield Township homeowners repair their homes. The home rehabilitation program will provide assistance up to \$25,000 to help with home repairs including windows, roofs, floors, heating systems, insulation, woodwork,

plumbing and similar work to remedy serious home deficiencies.

The Small Cities grant is the fourth grant received by the Township since 2006 to provide home rehabilitation grants to income-qualified homeowners. If you are interested in learning more about the program, please contact Amy Colaneri at 451-3811, ext 133.

Preschool and Kindergarten Registration May 16 & 23

Seabrook School will hold Preschool and Kindergarten registration by appointment only on Wednesday, May 16th and Wednesday, May 23rd, Children who will enter Preschool for the 2012-13 school year must be 4 years of age on or before October 1, 2012.

Children who will enter Kindergarten must be 5 years of age on or before October 1, 2012.

All students entering school for the first time will be required to have a physical examination by his/her family doctor, original birth certificate, immunization information and proof of residency. A physical form will be provided for your doctor to complete.

Just A Friendly Reminder From Your Dog Registrar



Please register your dog, if you have not done so already, for the current year.

All dogs 7 months or older, or having a permanent set of teeth must be licensed.

The state requires that a rabies shot be valid for the first 10 months out of the current year.

If your dog's renewal rabies shot occurs after April 30th, please bring a note from the Veterinarian stating that the pet's shot was not due until this date and the late fee will be waived for medical reasons.

Home Rehabilitation Grants

Upper Deerfield Township is accepting new applications from homeowners who would like to take advantage of the home rehabilitation program.

The home rehabilitation program provides assistance up to \$25,000 to help with home repairs including windows, roofs, floors, heating systems, insulation, woodwork, plumbing and similar work to remedy serious home deficiencies. Half of the assistance provided converts to a grant in six years. The other half is only paid back (without interest) when the homeowner sells the home.

Know The Rules Before Installing Your Prefabricated Shed

Thinking of putting a prefabricated shed on your property? There are a few things you need to know before you get started.

1. A zoning permit is required for **ALL** sheds. (No exceptions)
2. A building permit is required if your shed is larger than 100 square feet. If your shed is under 100 square feet you do not need a building permit.
3. Your application for a building permit must include the following:
 - A. An approved zoning permit
 - B. The manufactures booklet describing the shed
 - C. The building technical sheet filled out with signatures, costs, and the date.

Once a complete package is submitted to the construction office, it will be reviewed and priced out. When the office receives your payment, the permit is issued. Usually this process takes 1 week to 10 days from start to finish.

Convenience Center Vehicle Stickers 2012-14

Your 2012-2014 Convenience Center Vehicle Stickers will be available at the Municipal Building located at 1325 State Highway 77, Seabrook, NJ, 08302 beginning May 14th. Due to previous complaints about unauthorized individuals using the Township's Convenience Center, we are asking all residents who use the facility to complete the application form so we may update our records and issue you the new sticker. The application form is available to download on the Township's website www.upperdeerfield.com under the public forms bullet point or if you contact the building we will mail a form to you. If you are not listed on the Township's tax records, a proof of residency will be necessary. If you are a renter, please submit a copy of your lease agreement.

After May 14th, there are three ways to receive your new 2012-2014 Convenience Center Vehicle Sticker:

1. Bring the completed form along with your vehicle registration to the Municipal Building. Hours of operation are 8:30am to 4:30pm Monday through Friday.
OR
2. Mail the completed form with your registration information to 1325 Highway 77, Seabrook, NJ 08302. We will then issue your new sticker through the mail.
OR
3. Fill out the application form online and electronically submit the completed form and we will mail you your new sticker.

If you require an additional sticker or replacement sticker, it must be obtained at the Municipal Building at a cost of \$10.00 each. Stickers will not be issued to non-residents or businesses. **The 2010-2012 Sticker will expire on July 31, 2012.**

Eight Municipalities Sharing Court 3

The Cumberland County municipalities of Deerfield, Greenwich, Hopewell, Lawrence, Shiloh, Stow Creek and Upper Deerfield and the Salem County municipality of Pittsgrove have agreed to form a new regional municipal court to be known as Cumberland Salem Regional Municipal Court aka C.S. Regional Municipal Court, to serve the participating municipalities with Upper Deerfield Township serving as the host municipality.

This shared service of a joint municipal court is one of the outcomes of a recently completed regional shared services study funded by a grant from New Jersey Department of Community Affairs and coordinated by Cumberland Development Corporation. The new regional court is expected to reduce the joint deficit of nearly \$250,000 experienced by the eight separate courts in 2010, to less than \$100,000, saving these municipalities varying amounts totaling in excess of \$150,000.

The municipal governing bodies and their representatives to the joint court committee have worked together over several months to reach agreement to replace their local courts with this new regional court. These municipalities, with mixed Republican and Democratic majorities, have put political affiliations and provincial considerations aside to work together to find a more economical way to provide for the administration of justice for their residents.

A. Paul Kienzle serves as the Judge, Edward Duffy is the Prosecutor, Stephen Kernan is the Public Defender and Patricia Adams is the Court Administrator in the new regional court.

The construction of the new Seabrook Water Treatment Facility is completed and operational. The Seabrook Treatment Facility includes a building for radionuclide treatment, a building to complete the treatment of the water and a new water well.

This \$3.3 million dollar Seabrook Water Treatment Facility was made possible through a grant of \$1,000,000 million dollars with the balance through a low interest 40-year fixed loan from the United States Department of Agriculture.



Warm Weather Means Early Start for Tick Season



What does the warm weather mean for the tick threat?

"One would expect to see them earlier this year, but in theory there won't be more ticks than usual," Barton says. "However, given the warm weather, people will be outdoors more frequently and therefore more often exposed to ticks, and the number of opportunities for infection is more important than the number of ticks."

How will I know if I have been bitten by a tick?

"Ticks have some sort of anesthetic in their spit, so you are not going to feel it when it bites you," Barton says. "That means you have to check yourself thoroughly. They can be hard to spot. Nymphs, which are the size of a poppy seed, spread the most infection to humans because they are harder to spot and less picky about what they eat -- they are teenagers, desperate and hungry -- while larger adult ticks tend to favor smaller mammals."

What should I do if I find a tick on me?

"First, it's not a medical emergency, so you don't need to dial 911," Barton says. "In most cases, ticks take an hour or so to crawl somewhere dark and warm -- the back of your knee, your groin, the crack of your butt -- and start feeding. If it hasn't settled in to feed, you can brush it off. If it is already feeding, it takes more than a day to pass along any infection it might be carrying."

To remove it, use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick close to the skin and pull up with even pressure without twisting or jerking the tick. Don't use your fingers -- they are crude tools, and they can squish the tick, which can then squirt their guts, which is what carries infection, into you. If some of the tick pieces get left behind, that's OK. You will do more harm than good to dig into your skin to look for leftovers. Your body will heal fine even if a little bit of the tick is left in you.

2. Apply fertilizer at the spreader setting shown on the bag.

Is your septic system losing you money?

Properly functioning septic systems can add to property values. Having your system pumped out every three years will keep your system functioning well and will add to its lifespan. It will also help maintain sanitary conditions for your family, your home and your well water.

Ignore your waste disposal system and you will have trouble ahead. It could cost you as much as \$30,000 to replace your system if you let it deteriorate. But it costs only a few hundred dollars to have it properly maintained.

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH WASHING YOUR CAR?

Washing your car on a paved surface can allow the soapy wash water and other pollutants, like oil and grease, to run off into a storm drain. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that, in large amounts can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains, which flows directly into lakes, rivers and the ocean. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow, which can be harmful to the water quality.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Take your car to a car washing facility, rather than washing it yourself. Commercial car washes treat and recycle the water.
- If you can't get to a car washing facility, wash your car on an unpaved surface and use biodegradable soap.
- Organize a Car Wash Fundraiser for a local organization. Visit www.cleanwaterNJ.org to learn how.

WHY SHOULD YOU CARE ABOUT CLEAN WATER?

Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to New Jersey's clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, places for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly to our streams, rivers, lakes and oceans.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.
